Directions to April 30 Meeting

The Tredyffrin Public Library is off the Main Line (Route 30), not far from the Devon Horse Show grounds.

From Philadelphia: Take I-76 or the PA Turnpike West to King of Prussia/Valley Forge. Take Route 202 South to the Swedesford Rd exit just after King of Prussia mall. Take the first left onto Swedesford Rd, then the next left onto Old Eagle School Road. Follow Old Eagle School Road 2 miles to traffic light at Upper Gulph Road, and turn left. The Library is 0.2 mile on the right.

Or take I-476 South (or North) to Rt. 30 and use the directions “from the South” below.

From the West or Southwest: Take I-76 East to King of Prussia/Valley Forge, then follow directions above. Or, take Route 202 North (e.g. from Rt 1) to West Valley Road. Turn right at the traffic light onto West Valley Road. Follow West Valley about 2 miles up a long hill and down to a stop sign. Turn left onto Upper Gulph Road, and proceed through the traffic light about 0.3 mile. The Library is on the right.

From the South: Take I-95 North to I-476 North to Rt. 30 (Villanova/St. Davids) West. Take Rt 30 (E Lancaster Ave.) 2.5 miles to Old Eagle School Rd. Turn Right, and go 0.7 miles to Upper Gulph Rd. Turn Right, and the library will be on your right.

Sporting in *Hosta*: Blame It On the Chromosomes and Cells In the Meristem

An elementary discussion explaining various sporting mechanisms in hostas, such as:

- solid-colored leaves changing to variegated leaves
- multi-colored leaves changing to single-colored leaves
- diploid changing to (partly and fully) tetraploid and aneuploid.
- tetraploid changing to diploid

Tissue culture propagation is reviewed.

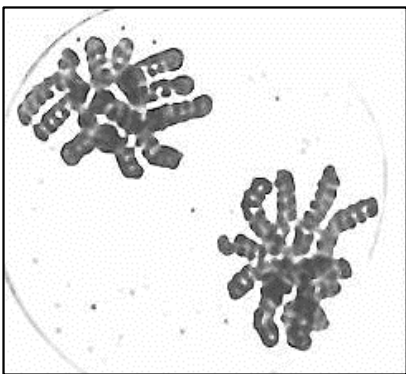
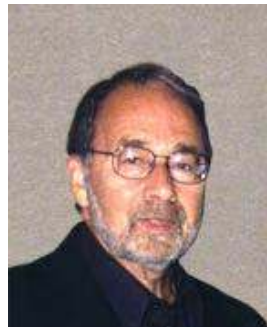
Also, new findings on *H.* 'Blue Mouse Ears' are highlighted, time permitting.

NO BOTANICAL BACKGROUND REQUIRED.

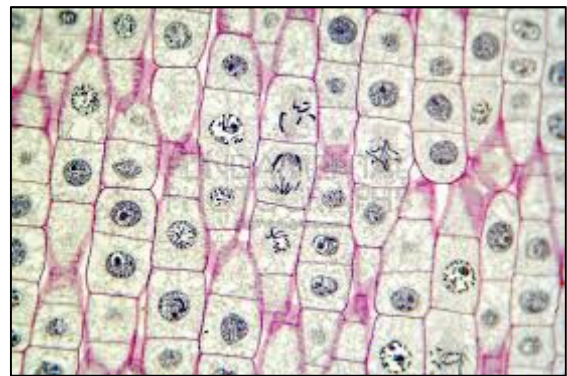
The intent is a classroom-like presentation using PowerPoint slides with photos and descriptions,

augmented with illustrations sketched on a dry-erase board. There are no handouts. (Bring pad and stylus or perhaps iPad for note taking.)

Warren Pollock is a founder of the Delaware Valley Hosta Society. For more than 25 years he has written "What's in a Hosta Name?" and other columns in The American Hosta Society's *The Hosta Journal*. Since 2010, he has carried out hosta chromosome and sporting studies with Dr. Ben J. M. Zonneveld in the Netherlands, a world authority on plant genetics

DVHS Spring Plant Sale, 2016

All plants subject to availability. The weather.....

Here are the rules for the day (subject to revision):

- Please bring a small plastic lined box, basket or bag to put your purchases in.
- Pick a number from the hosta bucket at the membership table (entrance door).
- Plant sales will run on a lottery rotation (based on your lucky number), giving everyone a chance to pick two plants with each rotation. After a few rotations, remaining hostas left will be up for sale to anyone still buying!
- Check out will be at the membership table at the end of the meeting. Bring your hostas to the table. Hostas will be priced at \$15. Cash or check only.

American Fashion (Wade NR) Medium-Large

Van Wade is as American as it gets, and many of his hostas are named for native American tribes, or simply tagged with "American." He discovered this gold-centered sport of H. 'Fortunei Aoki', a selection or close relative of 'Fortunei Hyacinthina'. So that makes this not quite a 'Gold Standard': the margin should be wider. Grow them both and compare!



Blue Tooth (Doug & Mardy Beilstein, 2011) Medium



A Beilstein Blue, to be sure, arising from the cross of 'June' with 'Azure Snow', which is a seedling of wax-backed H. hypoleuca. So that makes it blue on top and blue underneath, all packed into lance-shaped leaves with closely-spaced veins. Perhaps surprisingly, it is more compact than either parent.

Chart Topper (Zilis NR) Medium-Large

Back in the olden days, Wayside Gardens released a hosta they called 'Perry's True Blue' (from Pete Ruh? Registered 1981). Probably a seedling of 'Sieboldiana', it grew patiently until the sport 'Paul's Glory' brought it fame. Two or three sporting cycles later, Mark Zilis released this back-to-blue beauty, with thick leaves and lavender flowers. Maybe its chromosomes doubled along the line?



Enterprise (Zilis 2009) Medium

Should you be surprised that this is related to 'Vulcan'? Both are sports of 'Captain Kirk', having white centers. I would say that 'Enterprise' has wider green margins, so it should grow better. Coming from 'Gold Standard', it will have similar lavender flowers (with little or no seed set).

Hearts Galore (Beilstein NR) Small

A cute widdle hosta, green with white edges, selected from seedlings of the streaked 'Splish Splash'. There is ONE picture of this baby on the Internet, so you'll have to see this in person.



Jaws (Scheer NR) Small-Medium

This toothy treasure comes from the garden of Alttara Scheer, who creates some funky plants (including 'Funky Monkey'). So this one is green, but even from some distance you can see it is special. And dangerous! I bet this will show up in some breeding programs.

**Mingo** (Wade 2007) Large-Very large

The Mingo people were a sub-tribe of the Iroquois living in Ohio (where Van Wade is), but may have originally come from the mid-Atlantic. If you have ever visited Wade and Gatton Nursery, you'll know he grows a lot of green plants, many with historical significance related to the earliest American hosta hybridizers. 'Mingo' is a selection of unknown parentage, with medium green leaves and heavy flower heads.

**Pie à la Mode** (Zilis 2010) Medium-Large

This slice of pie is a stable form from the streaked 'Color a la Mode', which resulted from the old-time streaker 'Color Fantasy' crossed with white-backed *H. hypoleuca*. The heart-shaped leaves emerge with a clear yellow margin, which turns near white later in the season. Very new to the trade. Serve me up a piece!

**Sacramento** (Zilis 2010) Medium-Large

Another new one, this is the green-edged form of the large, corrugated gold hosta 'Sutter's Mill'. The parentage includes Mildred Seaver's 'High Noon'. I sense a Western Theme bed in your future.

**Scarlet and Gray** (Pete & Jean Ruh 2010) Medium?

Not much is known about this one, but the scarlet refers to the petioles (leaf stems). And of course it comes from O-HI-O! White flowers on this one. If you can find a picture, you're doing better than I am.

**Splendid Sarah** (Dick & Jane Ward 2005) Medium

This one is a sleeper: not new, but looks like a beauty. A seedling selection out of the classic Kevin Vaughan streaker, 'Pin Stripe Sister'. Should have pale lavender flowers.

**T N T** (Zilis/Vanous 2010) Large

Another newbie, and another Zilis sport out of 'Orange Marmalade'. This one has much wider green margins, which makes for stronger growth. Caution: may spontaneously combust, or at least burn a hole in your wallet! It's hard to search for (note the spaces in 'T N T'), so I could only find one picture.

**Winter Warrior** (Goodwin 2005) Medium-Large

Could be one of the best white-edged hostas in a while, with a wide creamy-white margin that laughs at the sun. Depending on who you ask, this could be another newer plant from a classic breeder, Florence Shaw's 'Fascination'. Near-white flowers with pale lavender stripes.

Fall Meeting 2015 Shaping the Shade Garden

The Montgomery County 4H Center was the site of our meeting, which was sponsored graciously by Master Gardeners.

Becca Boylan showed us some great suggestions for understory plantings in shade gardening. Sometimes we hosta fanatics fail to notice the space between our plants and the tree tops towering over them. Conny Parsons showed us how to relate the various classifications of hosta leaf color to garden design. Some beautiful examples of planting ensembles were presented. Kathy Miller (me) reminded everyone that light is important in the shade garden. Use of a light meter (smart phone app) in darker areas can be helpful. Good vegetative growth requires 15,000 to 50,000 lux.

From Stephen Fugate:

Semolina Rosemary Pignoli Cookies

Extra Virgin (Gabriele Corcos and Debi Mazar, 2014)

Tuscany-inspired treats, great with coffee (or anytime). This is a "chilled dough" recipe that you can make ahead and bake the next day (or when desired)

½ c pine nuts

½ lb butter (2 sticks) at room temperature

1 c sugar

1 large egg, lightly beaten

1 ¾ c all-purpose flour

½ c fine semolina flour

¼ t salt

2 t fresh rosemary, finely chopped

1 t grated orange zest

1. In a small skillet, lightly toast the pine nuts over high heat until they just begin to color, 3–4 minutes. Do not burn. Transfer to a bowl to cool.

2. Using a mixer, cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Add egg and mix until well combined.

3. Combine flour, semolina flour, salt, rosemary, and orange zest. With mixer on low speed, add this to butter/egg mixture and stir to form a stiff cookie dough. Add toasted pine nuts and mix to combine.

4. Divide the dough into two pieces. Roll each into a log, 1 ½ to 2 inches in diameter. Wrap each in plastic wrap and refrigerate at least one hour. (Can store overnight or several days, at least, until ready to bake.)

5. Preheat oven to 350°F.

6. Lay a sheet of parchment or Silpat on a cookie sheet. Unwrap dough logs, and slice into ¼ inch rounds. Transfer to sheet, leaving 1 ½ inches of space between cookies (they will spread more than you think). You should fit 15 or 20 to a sheet. Each log should make one sheet.

7. Bake until cookies look crisp on edges, about 12 minutes, rotating the pan half-way through cooking as needed. Let cool on sheet for a few minutes, then transfer to rack to cool completely. Makes about 30–40 cookies, depending on thickness of dough log.
